I am very excited to announce Dr. Robert Boone, is our new Director of Operations and will become our new Executive Director, as I will be retiring from the Museum this fall as Director. Dr. Boone brings a wealth of knowledge and experience with non-profit and historical experiences to our Association. Upon completion of our transition period, I have been named by the Board of Trustees, Director Emeritus and will assist the Association in an advisory role. This new change is very exciting for me as it will allow additional time for family, church, and activities at our family farm.

This fall is also a time for me to express to my family, and our members, patrons, friends, and staff my appreciation for your assistance as the Executive Director. I have been honored to serve on the Board of Trustees, serve as Board President and for the last eight years serve as your Executive Director. Thank you for your prayers, words of encouragement, financial support, and the great spirit of volunteerism in Maysville. We live in a wonderful community that is truly as we like to say, "the center of the universe".

The last eight years have been an exciting time in our Association's 146-year history

with expansion of programs, services, record attendance, outreach programs and galleries in three buildings on our historic Museum Campus. Our attendance in 2023 continues at a record level with visitors at the end of September 2023 from 48 states, the District of Columbia and 18 countries around the world. The addition of the Limestone

Building to house our bourbon history galleries along with adjacent parking lot was a highlight event in 2018. The Old Pogue Experience in the Limestone Building in August 2023 has become a satellite location of the Pogue distillery. We have been able to expand and offer new interactive displays for our guests. We have updated and enhanced our virtual web page, added numerous computers for both staff and guest use in the Research Library. The Museum has opened the Ford Galleries on the second floor of the Limestone Building to showcase the artistic and educational collection of model ships. The Museum's collection of fine art, paintings by Steve White, historic maps to the KSB Miniatures Collection, the quality of the exhibits are of the finest level. I appreciate the many patrons and friends that have assisted with building our collection of local historical artifacts and the loaning of items for exhibits and special presentations.

I thank you for being a Museum Member and for helping to build the legacy of *The Kentucky Gateway Museum Center*. Remember before tomorrow becomes yesterday ... visit your Gateway Museum.

The Kentucky Gateway Museum Center is very grateful for a generous grant from The Bartlett Tree Service for work, including new cabling and trimming, of the Siberian Elm Tree in the front yard of the Museum Center.

The work was completed in August on the Siberian Elm under the direction of Guy A. Fortner, a board-certified master arborist along with a crew of certified arborists from the Cincinnati office of Bartlett Tree services. The "witness tree" is the largest Siberian Elm on the Kentucky Tree registry with an approximate age of 125 years.

The Connecticut based landscaping company has over 100 offices around the world. The company is one of the world's leading scientific tree and shrub care companies. Bartlett Tree Service experts hold the appointment for arborist services for the British royal family and their properties.

To assist in the ongoing maintenance needs of the Museum's yard and landscape spaces, we have created a new giving opportunity for our members, patrons, and visitors to maintain and improve our historic museum yard lawn and garden. The Siberian Elm located in our front yard, is supported and enhanced by our irrigation system, perennial plants, blooming trees, shrubs, and ground cover. This new fund will assist not only with maintenance but improvements in the future. The new fund is *The Green (Gateway Resources Enhancing Environmental Needs) Fund for the KYGMC Yard and Grounds*. Donations can be mailed to the Museum Center or left at the Atrium Desk in the Browning Building.

The Museum is very grateful to the Bartlett Tree Service for their work and their generosity in helping with the Siberian Elm maintenance.













#### The Old Pogue Experience opened the Satellite Location on September 1, in the Limestone Building.

The goal has always been to operate the Old Pogue Experience as a satellite location since the bourbon galleries opened in October of 2018. The ability to operate the satellite location was due to recent changes in regulations made by the Kentucky Alcohol Beverage Control. Special thanks to Senator Steve West and State Representative William Lawrence and others in the General Assembly who were able to pass the legislation for the changes in the regulations.

The Old Pogue Experience – Satellite Location is able to sell any Pogue products including Old Pogue Master Select, Maysville Club along with their single barrel products. Henry Pogue V and Master Distiller John Pogue participated in the ribbon cutting at the Old Pogue Experience.













## Miniatures of the Month

Movies have always been a part of Janet Middlebrook's life. The California native grew up watching old movies with her mother and to this day can recall lines recited by the likes of Clark Gable, Jean Harlow and Betty Davis to name a few. She can also tell you

what they were wearing.

"I love clothing from past eras," explains the IGMA Fellow who has been creating 1/12th-scale clothing for 45 years. "Classic movies are one of my favorite things mainly because of the storyline, the stars and the wonderful fashions ... the designers in Hollywood could outdo any in Paris."

Her love of period-specific fashion is all-encompassing, she adores the fabrics and trimming, the detail and talent it took to create the costuming and the stories behind the wardrobe history. "Beaders, as they were known, were paid some of the highest wages," explains Janet of the Hollywood seamstresses. "Some of the gowns they made were so heavy the stars actually lost several pounds while wearing them!" She goes on to tell of slant boards that were used between takes so actresses could rest without sitting down to ruin the look of the costume. Some outfits were incredibly heavily jeweled and boned making them quite rigid. Others, she says, were actually glued to the star's body to achieve a very smooth look.



Knowing these tidbits, one can only imagine what it takes to create these designs in miniature and Janet is a master of the craft in fine scale. You have no doubt seen her exceptional work in the wedding display we exhibit each year and in other vignettes throughout the gallery. Recently, I acquired a couple pieces I fell in love with simply because I could see myself wearing them ... in a past decade of course, but still wearing them. The 1920s peach silk evening dress is made for dancing with its two-media skirt—one part being silk chiffon. The skirt is cut on a circle so when worn it swings and sways beautifully.

The pearls on this dress are from about 1900 and were probably made in what was formerly Czechoslovakia. A matching slip or nude color slip would have been worn underneath this piece in the Roaring '20s.

And I know I'm not the only woman who could envision herself wearing Janet's faux fur coat. She used vintage luxe fabric for the

coat which she designed in a style popular from the 1930s to 1960s. "Silk velvet," says Janet, "is very hard to find and very hard to work with because it moves and wiggles every time you touch it. I feel it is worth the effort, though, because of the drape and the look of mink or beaver." Well worth it, indeed!

Look for Janet's latest piece, reminiscent more of Brando than Bogart, in front of our miniature Cox Building this month. Her vintage leather biker jacket will likely be draped over the motorcycle in true Hollywood fashion!
