During the summer months, the Wormald Galleries and Calvert Hallway feature a KYGMC produced exhibit. Child's Play, showcasing toys from

Your Museum is excited to announce a new giving opportunity for our members, patrons and visitors to maintain and improve our historic museum yard and garden.

Miniatures of the Month: New Acquisitions

As many of you may already know, Tandy and I attended The Tom Bishop International Miniatures Show in Chicago this past April. It is the largest miniatures show in the world and this year included over 200 dealers from more than 20 different countries. While my

purpose there was to sign and sell copies of *Collectively Speaking: My Passionate Pursuit of Miniatures* Volumes 1 and 2, I was also able to do a little shopping for the KSB Miniatures Collection and I'm thrilled to debut some of the new items here.



Parget House by Nell Corkin (above): Nell's 144th-scale houses always amaze museum visitors and this one will undoubtedly have the same effect. The Parget House is one of the most unusual designs I have seen Nell create. Pargeting, a decorative plasterwork, is a technique that was used in 16th and 17th century England to update half-timbered houses. Many of those homes still exist in the Essex town of Saffron Waldon where she traveled to study the architecture. Nell's detail work in very small scale is what gives depth to the inside of her houses as shown in the wood beams on the walls and ceiling of this Tudor cottage which she furnished in early 20th century style.

Antique hand-carved bone table (right): This antique miniature was purchased at the show from a dealer but

unfortunately no maker was known. I only like to use these type items in very old settings representing where the carved items would have been used or displayed as an heirloom. You may recall a similar carved chess table in *Savage Manor* which is characteristic of the Tudor period. The delicacy of the carving and style of this table make it an outstanding piece which I am considering placing in *Catherine*

Palace. Another interesting example of this type is a carved Bible box in *Folly Lane*.

Sewing table by John Davenport (right): I have several sewing cabinets in the collection, but this one is very different with mother-of-pearl inlay on the top and for the keyhole. The unusual table shape, carved demi-lune bottom box and use of various stained woods and white decorative inlays on the curved legs make it unique in every way. I believe it may be late 18th or early 19th century design. Look for it in

the Fine Arts Rotunda.



Portrait of a Young Man by Johannes Landman (below): Johannes's 1/12th-scale reproduction of Pierre Mignard's 1654 oil on canvas of the same title is remarkable to see in person. The 17th century French artist who spent over 20 years studying in Italy was known for his religious and mythological scenes, as well as for his work as a court painter under Louis XIV. According to the National Gallery Prague where the original is located, Mignard "combines the tradition of the French prestigious portraiture and the colour scheme of the Venetian painters." Johannes's rendition captures those qualities and more on a canvas of less than 4 by 3 inches. Several of Johannes's paintings can be seen throughout the collection including one of my favorites, Portrait of a Young Boy with a Golf Club and Ball. This one will go in Savage Manor.



These acquisitions will soon be placed in the gallery and I hope you will search them out. If any of you would like to know more about the annual Tom Bishop International Show, I would love to share the details with you. Enjoy your summer everyone. I hope to see you in the gallery.

Over the course of the 19th Century, people around the world were fascinated by dinosaurs and their fossilized bones that kept popping up. No one seemed more obsessed than

American paleontologists Edward Cope and O.C. Marsh. Cope discovered 56 new species with 13,000 specimens while Marsh found 80 with tons of his bones now found in the Smithsonian.


The Historical Fiction book, *Dragon Teeth*, by Michael Crichton, puts you in the feud between the two men who produced some of the most spectacular dinosaur discoveries of all time. Their discoveries occurred during a period of time in the wild west that was notorious for gunslingers, Indian Wars, gritty lawmen and dangerous outlaws, business tycoons and American pioneers pushing to the edge of the continent.


